

# **Neighbourhood Plan Launch Consultation Exercises**

Date: March 14th 2024 Time: 18.00 to 20.00. Venue: Beckington Memorial Hall

# Attendees / sample size

Detailed head count: 82. Some had already left and others subsequently arrived.

**NB:** For ease of reference for the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group (NPSG) has applied percentages based on the number of respondents.

#### 1. CONSULTATION EXERCISE: HOUSING DESIGN

#### **Methodology**

34 photos on the display board: 10 provided by the AECOM Design Code team and 24 of existing post war houses in the Parish. Photographs were randomly positioned on the display board.

Question: If further housing is allocated, which of these design elements do you like / dislike?

Activity: Put a green thumbs up or a red thumbs down sticker on the photos.

#### **Sample**

409 stickers: 184 greens thumbs up stickers. 225 red thumbs down stickers.

The photo order number in the spreadsheet is the order the photos were in on the launch display board. Please see the annotated photo on page 4 to identify the housing styles referred to in the spreadsheet.

There are more stickers recorded in the spreadsheet than on the photo on page 4 as the photo was taken before the NPSG members took part in this exercise and added stickers.

#### **Key findings**

- Clear likes and dislikes of the post war modern builds in the Parish;
- Useful information for AECOM Design Code:
  - one clear preferred design (photo 5) from the ten photos they provided;
  - strong rejection of two designs (photos 3 and 4).



# 2.CONSULTATION EXERCISE: WHAT IS UNIQUE ABOUT THE PARISH THAT YOU WOULD MOST LIKE TO BE PROTECTED?

#### <u>Methodology</u>

Different coloured plain postcards for each of Beckington, Rudge and Standerwick.

Question: What would you most like to be protected?

Activity: Respondents invited to write on a postcard and post in the box provided.

Open ended.

#### Sample

62 respondents: 60 Beckington; 1 Rudge; 1 Standerwick. 109 comments: Beckington 97; 5 Rudge; 7 Standerwick.

#### Key findings

The main things respondents would most like to protect are:

- Views: 61.90% of respondents; 39 comments 35.78% of comments;
- Conservation area: 17.46% of respondents; 11 comments 10.09% of comments;
- Footpaths: 14.29% of respondents: 9 comments 8.26% of comments.
- Agricultural land:12.70% of respondents; 8 comment 7.33%. Half specified Grade 1.
- Only 1.59% of respondents, 1.08% of comments, would most like to protect green spaces within the village.

#### Representative written comments:

"Footpaths and the agricultural views from them"

"Beautiful field and livestock views from the conservation area and footpaths"

"Amazing views of rural countryside near and from the conservation area"

"Conservation area. Agricultural views from footpaths"

"Footpaths and the agricultural views from them"

"Lovely buildings in the centre. Footpaths and walks and views. Conservation area"

'Conservation area: beauty and sense of place"

"Rural, countryside, agricultural views out of and into the conservation area"

"Wonderful views and open spaces. Excellent access"

"Protect green margins/space around the village including green vistas from incoming roads"

"There is limited top quality Grade One agricultural land in Beckington. This should be protected and, if any land is needed for housing, this should be lower Grade Three land of which there is a lot in Beckington"

"Don't develop Grade 1 fields to future proof against the climate crisis. Once they are gone they are gone"

"Grade A fields. Increase local food + agriculture production. If developed lost forever"

"Grade 1 farming land"

"Protecting all the existing agricultural land as such please"!



#### 3. CONSULTATION EXERCISE: UNIQUE SENSE OF PLACE

#### <u>Methodology</u>

Different coloured jigsaw pieces for each of Beckington, Rudge and Standerwick.

Questions: what is unique about the Parish:

- What makes the place we love beautiful?
- What gives it its unique sense of place?
- What is your favourite thing to do or see in our beautiful setting?

Activity: Respondents invited to write on a jigsaw piece and post in the box provided.

Open ended.

#### Sample

57 respondents

101 comments: 94 Beckington; 4 Rudge; 3 Standerwick.

#### Key findings

The main things that make the parish unique, beautiful and give it its unique sense of place are:

- Views 38.60% of respondents; 21.78% of comments;
- Footpaths 29.82% of respondents; 16.83% of comments;
- Historic buildings 19.30% of respondents; 10.89% of comments;
- Conservation area 12.28% of respondents; 6.93% of comments;
- Community spirit 12.28% of respondents; 6.93% of comments

#### Representative written comments

"Walks. Open views of countryside"

"Agricultural views and footpaths"

"Dog walking. MacMillan Way and Beckington Loop. Beauty of agricultural views"

"Superb number and variety of footpaths. My favourites are Stubbs Lane to Orchardleigh and the BeckingtonLoop: the kids and dogs love them"

"Walking the footpaths and seeing the sheep in the fields"

"Seeing the new lambs and the countryside unspoilt"

"Walking along Sue's Walk to the church. Walking through the fields to Lullington"

"Agricultural history and setting and conservation area give the sense of place"

"Beautiful views over open countryside"

"Walks. Open views of countryside"

"The view out of the Baptist Church Hall windows to sheep (or cattle) grazing on sloping field behind (where the pre-school were based"

"Unique = local community"

"A living village with a lot of history"

"Beautiful walks. The friendly folk. The church community"



#### 4. CONSULTATION EXERCISE: WHERE DO YOU LIVE?

# <u>Methodology</u>

Maps of Beckington village, Rudge and the small part of Standerwick that is in Beckington Parish on display board.

Activity: Put a dot sticker where you live.

# **Sample**

Total Dots: 47

NB: Couples (the majority of respondents) put one dot for where they lived - not two.

- Beckington: 43


- Rudge: 2

- Standerwick: 2

# **Key findings**

Whilst attendance from Rudge and Standerwick was very low there was a good geographic spread from across Beckington village.

#### 5.CONSULTATION EXERCISE: WHAT IS YOUR FAVOURITE VIEW?

#### **Methodology**

Satellite maps of Beckington village, Rudge and the small part of Standerwick that is in Beckington Parish on display board.

17 photos of views on the display board.

The photos were randomly placed on the display board and not adjacent to their location on the maps. The photos were randomly selected on the night by the main photographer.

Activity: Please put a dot sticker to indicate your favourite view.

# **Sample**

76 dots. Some respondents just put a dot on the maps, some only on the photos and a few on both.

# Beckington village:

Photos: 50 dotsMap: 15 dots

# Rudge:

Photos: 7 dotsMap: 1 dot

#### Standerwick:

Map: 3 dots

Photos: none provided.


#### **Key findings**

On both photos and maps:

- 68% of respondents showed their favourite view to be of fields to the west of Beckington village with 53% of respondents specifying the fields to the south of Mill Lane;
- 23% identified the church or churchyard as their favourite view;
- 9% of respondents showed their favourite view to be to the east of Beckington village.

NB: None of the favourite views nominated for Standerwick are in Beckington Parish. All three are in Berkley Parish.
